Frequently Asked Questions

Who may vote in this election?

Qualified voters of the Matanuska-Susitna Borough.

How old must I be to register to vote?

You must be 18 years of age to vote. You may register any time within 90 days immediately preceding your 18th birthday.

When are elections held?

The Matanuska-Susitna Borough will hold a regular election yearly on the first Tuesday following the first Monday in November. Special elections may be held in accordance with code.

How do I register to vote or update my voter registration record?

To register to vote or update your voter registration record, you must complete a voter registration application. You may complete an application online at **www.elections.alaska.gov** or you may print an application and return it to a voter registrar.

Voter registration applications are also available at any Alaska State Division of Elections Office; Alaska State Division of Motor Vehicles; through a voter registration agency to include the Borough Clerk's Office, the City Clerk's Office in Houston, Palmer, and Wasilla; or your local library.

Do I have to register for each election?

No. If you are registered to vote in State elections, you are automatically registered to vote in local (Borough) elections, provided your voter registration with the State was completed at least 30 days before the election and you listed a Mat-Su Borough address as your main residence.

What happens if I am in line to vote when the polls close at 8 p.m.? You will be allowed to vote if you are in line to vote when the polls close.

Where do I vote?

If you do not know where to vote, please see page 8, or call the Alaska State Division of Elections at 907-373-8952, or the Borough Clerk's Office at 907-861-8683, or visit https://myvoterportal.alaska.gov.

Is there an early/absentee voting site open on Election Day? No, there will not be an early/absentee voting site open on Election Day for the Mat-Su Borough.

ELECTION DAY NOV. 4TH

Voting Information

POLLING PLACES

The polls are open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. on Election Day. To locate your polling place, please refer to the information on page 8.

BRING IDENTIFICATION TO THE POLLS

You must be prepared to show one form of acceptable identification, which includes:

- Voter ID Card
- State ID Card
- Passport
- Birth Certificate

- Driver's License
- Valid Photo ID Card
- Military ID Card
- Hunting or Fishing License

If you do NOT have identification when voting, you will be asked to vote a questioned ballot. (See page 5 for more information.)

MARKING THE BALLOT

When voting the ballot, completely fill in the oval next to the candidate or issue you wish to vote for with a <u>black</u> or <u>blue</u> ink pen. Completely fill in the oval like this:

You only have to mark the races or issues you choose to vote for. If you mark more than one choice in a race or issue, that section of the ballot will NOT be counted. The sections of the ballot that are properly marked will be counted.

If you make a mistake marking your ballot, do NOT erase or correct the ballot. Return the spoiled ballot to an election worker and request a new ballot. You may only receive a replacement for a spoiled ballot two times for a total of three ballots issued.

CAMPAIGNING PROHIBITED IN OR NEAR THE POLLS (ELECTIONEERING)

Electioneering is an act that is meant to persuade voters to vote in a particular way. During the hours the polls are open, no person who is in the polling place or **within 200 feet** of any entrance of the polling place may attempt to persuade a person to vote for or against a candidate, proposition, or question. Examples of electioneering include: discussion of candidates or issues, displaying campaign signs, bumper stickers, buttons, hats, and other like items.

Voting Information

QUESTIONED BALLOT VOTING

You will be asked to vote a questioned ballot:

- If your name is NOT listed on the precinct register
- If you do not have identification
- If you choose to vote outside of your precinct on Election Day
- If your qualifications to vote have been challenged

Before receiving a ballot, you must complete a questioned ballot envelope. Your voted ballot will be placed in a secrecy sleeve and sealed inside your completed ballot envelope. The information you provide on the outside of the ballot envelope will be used to determine your voting eligibility and to update your voter registration record with the Alaska State Division of Elections. If for any reason your questioned ballot is not counted, you will be notified in writing.

ASSISTANCE TO VOTERS

Non-English speaking voters, voters who are blind, physically impaired, or otherwise incapable of marking a ballot, may bring a person, or if necessary two persons, of their choice with them to the poll to assist them in casting their ballot. The persons assisting the voter may not be a candidate for office in that election, a family member of a candidate for office in that election, the voter's employer, agent of the employer, or an officer or agent of the voter's union. The person providing assistance must take an oath before an election official not to divulge how the voter cast their ballot. Voters may also request an election official to assist them.

Polling locations within the Borough do not have language assistance for voters who have limited English proficiency. If you or someone you know needs language assistance, please contact the Borough Clerk's Office at 907-861-8683.

Magnifying ballot viewers for the visually impaired are available at all voting locations. If you have difficulty gaining access to your polling place, or if you have accessibility questions about your polling place, please contact the Borough Clerk's Office at 907-861-8683.

Voting Information

VOTING ASSISTANCE

A Touch Screen Voting unit will be available at the Mat-Su Borough DSJ Administration Building and the Mat-Su State Division of Elections October 20, 2025, through November 3, 2025. Touch screen voting is intended for the blind, the disabled, and voters with reading difficulties. The touch screen unit allows disabled voters to vote unassisted with a magnified, high contrast, and audio ballot.

VOTING BY PERSONAL REPRESENTATIVE

A voter with a disability, who because of that disability is unable to go to a polling location, may appoint a personal representative to obtain all voting information and a ballot from an election official. Special Needs voting is available during the voting period from any early/absentee voting location or at any polling location on Election Day.

You may also vote from the convenience of your home by applying for an absentee by-mail ballot. See page 23 for more information.


